For years yobs who were tanked up on lager and ouzo besieged the resort of Faliraki, giving it a reputation it could do without. Now it's the invasion of four- and five-star hotels which is slowly changing the island's image.

Sure, Faliraki is still a fun and lively place to stay, with plenty of wild nightlife. But Rhodes has so much more to offer and

Talking of class, you would be hard pressed to find a finer hotel than the adults-only Lindos Blu where I

stayed.

It is built on the side of a cliff overlooking stunning Vlicha Bay, and the guide books describe it as a chic boutique hotel.

All 70 rooms and villas have amazing views over the Aegean sea, while some of the posher suites boast luxurious lounges and huge balconies with Jacuzzis and private pools. Trust me, you will not want to leave the hotel.

If you want to take the kids you can always try Blu's four-

star sister hotel next door, Lindos Mare.

The hotels are just a few minutes' drive from the pretty town of Lindos which is overlooked by its ancient acropolis. Little alleyways filled with shops and restaurants lead up to the ruins, parts of which date back to the 4th Century BC. It's a tough

Lindos nightlife is low-key and centres mainly on the bars and restaurants. Mavrikos in the main square is very popular.



Lindos, you will love Rhodes old town which dates back to 408BC. Within its medieval walls lie a maze of narrow cobbled streets packed with fascinating boutiques selling everything from carvings and hand-made jewellery to bars of olive soap.

The old town has 11 gates and is nacked with historical gems

is packed with historical gems such as the Grand Master's Palace, once the HQ of the Knights of the Order of St John who conquered the island in 1309. One of the best restaurants is the award-winning Nireas where owner Theodoros talks you enthusiastically through his menu.

Away from the tourist hordes the mountain village of Embona, famous for its wines. Rhodes is not known for vintage



plonk but I was most impressed,

plonk but I was most impressed, especially after a few glasses.

But the real highlight of my visit was meeting 86-year-old Maria Konstantakis, a sweet little old lady who has become a local celebrity showing tourists inside the tiny one-room traditional Rhodian house where she has lived all her life.

Gems

It seemed a million miles from Faliraki's bright lights but summed up for me the real Rhodes.

On the drive down from the mountains it is well worth stopping for a photo. On a clear day you can see the coast of Turkey some 12 miles away.

Other gems off the beaten track are the Valley of the

track are the Valley of the

Butterflies in Petaloudes, home to thousands of the panaxia species, and Seven Springs in Epta Piges. The water here is supposed to improve your health but take care as you clamber over slippery rocks to drink from the streams. A fall here will not lengthen your life.

Back on the coast near Faliraki are the ancient Kallithea springs. The Italians built a monument here in 1929

It is a beautiful spot and featured in another classic war film, Escape To Athena, starring Roger Moore and David Niven.

Hotel at Ixia on the rugged north-west coast.

The hotel has recently opened some luxury suites, each with a private pool. It also has an amazing health spa — just the job after a hot day's sightseeing.

OK, so enough of all this luxury and adults-only boutique hotels. What about the kids?

Well, with the lager louts under control, I would recommend Faliraki any time. It might not be known for its history and sophistication but it has stacks to do, a great beach and plenty of family-friendly hotels to suit all budgets. Classy hotels such all budgets. Classy hotels such
